

Resources We for Public HEALTH Hepatitis A Information for Homeless/Transient Populations

Hepatitis A is a serious liver disease caused by the hepatitis A virus (HAV). Currently, several states including West Virginia are seeing an increase of HAV cases, and an outbreak has been declared in multiple states. **Homeless and transient individuals** are at high risk for contracting hepatitis A during this outbreak and should **seek a hepatitis A vaccine**.

HOW IS HEPATITIS A SPREAD?



Not washing hands with soap and running water



Illicit injection and non-injection drug use



Eating/drinking food contaminated with HAV



Sex with HAVinfected partners

HEPATITIS A SYMPTOMS

Jaundice (Yellowing of the skin or eyes) • Fever • Nausea • Vomiting •

Joint Pain • Fatigue • Loss of Appetite • Dark Urine •

Abdominal pain • Light-colored bowel movements

WHO IS AT HIGH RISK?

- People currently homeless or in transient living
- People who use illegal drugs

- Men who have sex with men (MSM)
- People recently in jail or prison

PREVENTING HEPATITIS A

Wash hands with soap and water after using the bathroom and before preparing food or eating.
Hand sanitizer does not kill hepatitis A virus.

Get vaccinated for Hepatitis A if you are at high risk. Highrisk individuals can get vaccinated for free at their local health department.
